

Installing the SIM and Memory Cards

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM or memory cards. Avoid exposing your cards to static electricity, water, or dirt.

Installing a SIM Card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.



Installing a Memory Card



You can install a memory card in your phone to store more multimedia files such as audio clips, pictures, and video clips. **Note:** If you install the memory card when your phone is turned on, you might have to turn the phone off and on again before you try to use the card.

- 1 Hold the phone with Insert the antenna facing fingertips here. away from you. Insert your fingertips between the faceplate and the metal trim piece and Pull use your fingertips to with fingertips. pull the metal trim piece off the phone. Press the card in 2 until it clicks into place. Insert memory card here.
- 3 Slide the metal trim piece back into place.

Battery Tips

Battery life depends on the network, signal strength, temperature, features, and accessories you use.

Getting Started

Getting Started

- Always use Motorola Original[™] batteries and chargers. The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature.
- When storing your battery, keep it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Never expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- It is normal for batteries to gradually wear down and require longer charging times. If you notice a change in your battery life, it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



Contact your local recycling center for proper battery disposal.

Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.






Installing the Battery



™ Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories.



Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Action

1 Plug the travel charger into the bottom of your phone.



- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
- 3 When your phone indicates **Charge Complete**, remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to your phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

Turning Your Phone On

Action

1 Press and hold for a few seconds or until the display turns on.



2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press the **OK** key to unlock the SIM card.


Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays **SIM Blocked**.

3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press the **OK** key to unlock the phone.

Adjusting Volume

Press up or down on volume keys to:

• increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call



- turn off an incoming call alert
- increase or decrease the ringer volume setting when the home screen is visible

Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the down volume key once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it again to switch to silent alert. Press the up volume key to cycle back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

Answering a Call

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

If **Open to Answer** is **On**, open the phone to answer the call.

Viewing Your Phone Number

To view your phone number from the home screen, press [m] [m].

While you are on a call, press \blacksquare > My Tel. Number.

Note: Your phone number must be stored on your SIM card to use this feature. To store your phone number on the SIM card, see page 53. If you do not know your phone number, contact your service provider.

Highlight Features



You can do much more with your phone than make and receive calls! This section describes some of your phone's highlight features.

Using a Removable Memory Card

You can use a memory card with your phone to store and retrieve multimedia objects (such as photos and sounds). To install a memory card, see page 7.

To view files on the memory card in a multimedia list (such as **Pictures** or **Sounds**), press (=) > **Switch Storage Device** > **TRANS**. To view files stored on your phone again, press (=) > **Switch Storage Device** > **Phone**.

Using the Memory Card as a USB Drive

You can access your phone's memory card with a PC.

Note: When your phone is connected to a computer, you can only access the memory card through the computer.

On your phone:

 > USB Settings > Memory Card



This directs the USB connection to your memory card. Attach the Motorola OriginalTM USB cable to the accessory port on your phone and to an available USB port on your computer. Then

- 1 Open your "My Computer" window, where your phone's memory card displays as a "Removable Disk" icon.
- 2 Click on the Removable Hard Drive icon to access the files on your phone's memory card.

To store the desired files onto the memory card, drag and drop them as follows:

 screen savers: > mobile > picture
 wallpapers: > mobile > picture
 video clips: > mobile > video

- 4 When you finish, remove the device by selecting the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray at the bottom of your screen. Then select "USB Mass Storage Devices" and "Stop".
- 5 Select "USB Mass Storage Device" then "OK".



Taking and Sending a Photo

Press D to display the camera viewfinder:



Tip: High-resolution images can only be stored on your memory card. To change picture resolution, press \square > **Pictures Setup** > **Resolution** from the camera viewfinder. For more **My Picture** menu options, see the table after the procedure.






If you close your phone while the viewfinder is active, the external display shows the image. Press the volume keys to zoom, or press the smart key to capture the image.



Recording Video Clips

Press \bigcirc and $\boxdot >$ Go To Video Mode to display the video viewfinder:



Note: You can only zoom before you start recording.

Tip: If you want to send your video in an MMS message, the video length must be set to MMS. To set length, press \boxed{I} > **Videos Setup** > **Video Length**. For more **Videos Menu** options, see the table after the procedure.

Sending a Multimedia Message



A *Multimedia Messaging Service* (MMS) message contains one or more slides with text and media objects (including photos, pictures, animations, sounds, voice records, and/or video

clips). You can send the multimedia message to other wireless phone users, and to email addresses.

Tip: You can answer an incoming call while you are creating a message. When you finish the call, you can find the message saved in \boxed{E} > **Messages** > **Drafts**.

Receiving a Multimedia Message



When you receive a multimedia message or letter, your phone displays the $\[mathbb{R}]$ (message waiting) indicator and a **New Message** notification, and sounds an alert.

READ key	open the message

Multimedia messages that you receive can contain different media objects:

- Photos, pictures, and animations are displayed as you read the message.
- A sound file or video clip begins playing when its slide is displayed. Use the volume keys to adjust the volume as the sound file or video clip plays.

Note: In an MMS letter, you may have to highlight an indicator in the text to play a sound file or video clip.

 Attached files are added to the end of the message. To open the attachment, highlight the file indicator/ filename and press the VIEW key (image file type),
 PLAY key (sound file or video clip), or OPEN key (object such as phonebook or datebook entry, or unknown file type).



Using the Phonebook

This section briefly describes basic phonebook operations. For more information about using the phonebook, see page 75.

Storing a Phone Number

Enter a phone number in the home screen, then press the **STORE** key to create a phonebook entry with that number. Fill in the other fields to complete the entry.

Select **MORE** to store another number (for example, a work number) under the same Name.

Recording a Voice Name

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Voice Name** and press the **RECORD** key. Press and release the voice key and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds). When prompted, press and release the voice key and repeat the name. Press the **DONE** key to store the voice name.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

Storing a Picture for Caller ID

You can store a picture for a phonebook entry. The picture appears when you receive calls from the entry.

Note: This option is not available for entries stored on the SIM card.

When creating a phonebook entry, scroll to **Picture** and press the **EDIT/ADD** key. Press $\hat{\phi}$ to select a picture, and press the **SELECT** key to store it for the entry.

Selecting a Number

Press () > Phonebook, then press $\hat{\phi}$ to scroll to a number. To quickly highlight entries in a long **Phonebook** list:

- If your entries are sorted by Name, Voice Name, or Email, press keys for the letters in the name. For example, press 5 [4] [7] for the first three letters of "Lisa". When the name you want appears at the bottom of your display, highlight it and press the SEARCH key to go to the entry. This works like iTAP[®] text entry (see page 44).
- If your entries are sorted by Speed No., press an entry's speed number to highlight it. For example, press
 5 for entry number 15.

Voice Dialing a Number

Press and release the voice key, and say the entry's name (within 2 seconds).

Note: To voice dial a phonebook entry you must first record a voice name for the entry (see page 26).



Sorting Phonebook Entries

Press (I) > Phonebook, press (I) > Setup > Sort by, then select whether you want to sort the phonebook list by Name, Speed No., Voice Name, or Email.

When sorting by name, you can view **All** numbers or just the **Primary** number for each name. To set the primary number for a name, see page 77.

Viewing Entries By Category

Press \square > Phonebook, press \square > Categories, then select whether you want to view All entries, entries in a predefined category (Business, Personal, General, VIPs), or entries in a category you created.

To set the category for a phonebook entry, see page 77.

Setting Picture ID View


Press 🗊 > Phonebook, press 🗊 > Setup > View by > Picture.

Using the Display

The *home screen* displays when you are *not* on a call or using the menu. You must be in the home screen to dial a phone number.



Press the 5-way navigation key $(\cdot \hat{Q} \cdot)$ left, right, up, or down to select one of the menu feature icons. If you select a menu icon by mistake, press a to return to the home screen.

Note: Your home screen may look different from the display shown above. For example, your service provider may hide the menu feature icons to allow a better view of

the wallpaper image. You can still select the menu icons when they are hidden from view. To show or hide the menu icons, see page 79.

The \exists (menu) indicator indicates that you can press the menu key (\exists) to enter the main menu.


Labels at the bottom corners of the display show the current soft key functions. Press the left or right soft key to

perform the function indicated by the left or right soft key label.



Your phone can display an analog or digital clock in the home screen (see page 79).

The following status indicators can display:



1. Data Transmission Indicator

Shows connection and data transmission status. Indicators can include:



2. Edge / GPRS Indicator



Shows that your phone is using a high-speed General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) or Edge network connection. Indicators can include:



E = Edge active

3. Signal Strength Indicator

Vertical bars show the strength of the network connection. You cannot make or receive calls when the x^{α} (no signal) indicator or $x^{\alpha} \times$ (no transmit) indicator displays.

4. Roam Indicator



Shows when your phone is seeking or using another network outside your home network. Indicators can include:

5. Active Line Indicator

Using the 5-Way Navigation Key



Use the 5-way navigation key $(\cdot \hat{Q} \cdot)$ to scroll up, down, left, or right through the menu system,

highlight menu items, change

feature settings, and play games. Press the center select button to select a highlighted menu item.

Using Menus

From the home screen, press 🗊 to enter the main menu.



Press $\hat{\mathbf{O}}$ to scroll to and highlight a menu feature icon in the main menu. The following icons represent features that may display in the main menu, depending on your service provider and service subscription options.


Selecting a Menu Feature

To select a menu feature, starting from the home screen:

This example shows that from the home screen, you must press \Box , scroll to and select log Recent Calls from the main menu, then scroll to and select Dialed Calls. Press $\cdot \hat{o} \cdot$ to scroll, and the left/right soft keys to select the functions displayed in the bottom left and right corners of the display.

Selecting a Feature Option

Some features require you to select an option from a list:



Press $\hat{\phi}$ to scroll up or down to highlight the option you want.

In a numbered list, press a number key to highlight the option.

In an alphabetized list, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters on the key and highlight the closest matching list option.

When an option has a list of possible values, press $\dot{\phi}$ left or right to scroll through and select a value.

When an option has a list of possible numeric values, press a number key to set the value.

Entering Text


Some features require you to enter information.



Press **CANCEL** key to exit without changes. **DONE** displays after you make changes.

Learning to Use Your Phone

The message center lets you compose and send text messages. A *Character Counter* indicates how many more characters will fit in the message.



Choosing a Text Entry Mode

Multiple text entry modes make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and messages. The mode you select remains active until you select another mode.

Press *#* in any text entry screen to select one of the following entry modes:

1 or 🕮	Your Primary text entry mode, which can be set to any iTAP® (印) or tap (1) mode (see following section).	
2 or 피 (if available)	Your Secondary text entry mode, which can be set to any iTAP (三) or tap (2) mode, or to None (see following section).

Alternatively, you can select a text entry mode in any text entry screen by pressing \blacksquare > Entry Mode.

Setting Up a Text Entry Mode

Press \blacksquare > Entry Setup from any text entry screen. Select Primary Setup or Secondary Setup, and choose:

ITAP	Let the phone predict each word as you press keys (see page 44).
Тар	Enter letters and numbers by pressing a key one or more times.
Tap Extended	Enter letters, numbers, and symbols by pressing a key one or more times.
None	Hide the Secondary setting (only available for Secondary Setup).

Using Capitalization

Press (1) in any text entry screen to change text case. The following indicators show capitalization status:

abc = no capital letters

Abc = capitalize next letter only

ABC = all capital letters

Using Tap Mode


This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

Tap mode cycles through the letters and number of the key you press. Tap Extended mode also cycles through additional symbols as shown in the chart on page 43.

When you enter text with **Tap** or **Tap Extended** mode, the soft key functions change.



When you enter 3 or more characters in a row, your phone may guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **prog** you might see:



If you want a different word (such as **progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Tap Mode Text Entry Rules

- Press a keypad key repeatedly to cycle through its characters.
- Press .¢. left or right to move the flashing cursor to the left or right in a text message.



- If you enter or edit information and do not want to save the changes, press (a) to exit without saving.

Using iTAP[®] Mode



iTAP software provides a predictive text entry mode that lets you enter a word using one keypress per letter. This can be faster than **Tap** mode, because your phone combines the keypresses into common words.

For example, if you press 7764, letter combinations that match your keypresses display:



If you want a different word (such as **Progress**), continue pressing keypad keys to enter the remaining characters.

Entering Words

In a text entry screen, you can press # to switch entry modes. An indicator shows which mode is active (see page 40). If **ITAP** mode is not available as the **Primary** or **Secondary** entry mode, see page 39.

If you enter a word your phone does not recognize, the phone stores it to use as one of your word options. When you fill memory space for unrecognized words, your phone deletes the oldest words to add new words.

Using Numeric Mode

In a text entry screen, press *#* to switch entry modes until the **123** (numeric) indicator displays.

Press keypad keys to enter the numbers you want. When you finish entering numbers, press (#) to switch to another entry mode.



Using Symbol Mode

In a text entry screen, press *#* to switch entry modes until the @ (symbol) indicator displays.

Deleting Letters and Words

Place the cursor to the right of the text you want to delete, and then:

Press the **DELETE** key to delete one letter at a time.

Hold the **DELETE** key to delete all the text.

Using the Smart Key

The smart key (see the diagram on page 1) gives you another way to perform many basic phone functions. It anticipates the next action you are likely to perform. For example, when you highlight a menu item, you can press the smart key to select it. The smart key usually performs the same function as the right soft key.



Using the External Display

When the flip is closed, the external display shows time and phone status information. It also displays

messages to notify you of incoming calls and other events.

- For descriptions of status indicators, see page 29.
- For a description of the external camera display, see page 19.

Note: You cannot make or receive calls when the phone is closed unless you attach a headset.

Using the Handsfree Speaker

Note: The use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

When you activate your phone's built-in handsfree speaker, you can talk to the other party without holding the phone to your ear.

Press the **SPEAKER** key to turn the handsfree speaker on or off during a call.

When you turn the handsfree speaker on, your phone displays **Speaker On** in the home screen. The handsfree speaker remains on until you press the **SPEAKER** key again or turn the phone off.

Note: The handsfree speaker is disabled when you connect your phone to a handsfree car kit or headset accessory.

Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6-digit security code is originally set to 000000. Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.

If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

You can also reset your SIM card PIN code, or PIN2 code if necessary.

To change a code or password:

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

You can lock your phone manually or set the phone to lock automatically whenever you turn it off.

To use a locked phone, you must enter the unlock code. A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or

Specific Absorption Rate Data

This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this model phone when

tested for use at the ear is 1.48 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.17 W/kg. The SAR value for this product in its data transmission mode (body-worn use) is 0.54 W/kg. (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements).²

Facilities

If you are concerned, you may want to limit your own or your children's RF exposure by limiting the length of calls or by using handsfree devices to keep mobile phones away from your head and body.

Your wireless phone lets you communicate by voice and data—almost anywhere, anytime, wherever wireless service is available and safe conditions allow. When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. If you choose to use your wireless phone while driving, remember the following tips:

- Get to know your Motorola wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a handsfree device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience to your wireless phone with one of the many Motorola Original[™] handsfree accessories available today.
- **Position your wireless phone within easy reach.** Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you receive an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or going through your address book

takes attention away from your primary responsibility—driving safely.

- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when your car is not moving or before pulling into traffic. If you must make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road.
- Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies.¹
- Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.¹
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.¹
